## Advanced Placement* English Literature and Composition Exam

The test is composed of two parts-multiple choice and free response.
Multiple Choice

- 4-5 passages (poetry, fiction, and drama) with 52-56 multiple choice questions, 55 questions on most recently released exams
- 1 hour
- $45 \%$ of the student score
- 1 point for correct answers, no penalty for incorrect answers or questions left blank
- College Board released exam answers include the percentages of students who took the test and got each question correct. On the 2009 released test, the range was from $33 \%$ answering correctly on a question to $93 \%$ correct. Difficulty level of questions varies; questions generally are in order as they appear in the text, not from easiest to most difficult.
Free Response
- 3 essays
- 1 analysis of poetry
- 1 analysis of fiction or drama
- 1 open question
- 2 hours
- $55 \%$ of the student score
- essays evaluated on a 1-9 scale

Test Content

- selections from 1600s-today
- multi-cultural selections
- approximately 41-45\% poetry (depending on the number of MC passages), with the rest of the selections from stories, novels, or plays
Additional Information
- usually taken at the end of the senior year
- composite scores range from 1-5
- college credit generally awarded for scores of 3 and above on a 5-point scale
- credit awarded for a passing score varies from university to university

Here is something to think about concerning the need to include poetry at all levels.

- The multiple choice section will include 2 or 3 poems; the MC section counts $45 \%$ of the student's score. Poetry will account for approximately $22.5 \%$ to $27 \%$ of the MC section.
- The free response section of the test accounts for $55 \%$ of the test, with the poetry question accounting for $18.3 \%$ of the total score.
- Overall, poetry accounts for approximately $45.3 \%$ of the test, an important percentage to consider if students have not had a strong background in the analysis of poetry.

If a student answered 28 MC items correctly and received a score of 6 on each essay, the Section I score would be 34.3616 ; the Section II score would be 55.0008 for a Composite Score of 89.3624. That number would be rounded to 89 for a test score of 3 .

If a student answered 33 MC items correctly and received a score of two 6 s and one 7 on the essays, the Section I score would be 40.4976; the Section II score would be 58.0564 for a Composite Score of 98.5540 . The Composite Score would be rounded to 99 for a test score of 4. Every MC item and essay point is extremely valuable to the final score.
